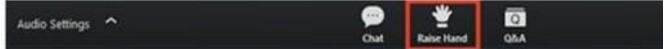

1. Call to Order – First Open Session 5:02 pm

Chair Long called the meeting to order at 5:02 pm.

1A. Pledge of Allegiance

Vice Chair McFadden led participants in the Pledge of Allegiance.

1B. Directors Roll Call

Roll call: (Chair Long, Vice Chair McFadden, Kimball, Meneghin, Pace, Villaseñor); all directors present.

1C. Public Comments

Chair Long asked if there were any public comments; none were offered.

1D. Approval of Agenda

<u>Motion</u>

Motion to approve the agenda, Vice Chair McFadden; Second, Director Villasenor. Roll call vote: six ayes (Chair Long, Vice Chair McFadden, Kimball, Meneghin, Pace, Villaseñor); none opposed. Motion carries 6/0.

2. UPDATES

2A Legal Counsel Update

Information Item

Legal Counsel Scott Nave stated he had no updates.

3. MOTION ITEMS

3A Sustainable Management Criteria Development

The Board received a presentation and considered adoption of the Agency's Draft Sustainable Management Criteria matrix and associated management actions and provided direction to Agency staff and consultant team toward development of the draft Groundwater Sustainability Plans. Mr. Tony Morgan from DBS&A presented (see slides).

Director Meneghin asked if the Board would entertain an additional option of providing funding to do a non-native species removal (Arundo and tamarisk) in the GDE areas, or if it is already in the mitigation plan to support resiliency for the GDEs. She also asked if the GSA will be able to develop a draft of the project for the GSP, or if it is not possible, can a GDE restoration project be included in the mitigation plan in the draft GSP, or if it might be more of a one- to five-year scale. Mr. Morgan said the GSA can come up with some concepts for the GSPs, but the details will have to wait until the CDFW program evolves for the Cienega project, as they are about 65 percent design, and the GSA will have to consult with them and obtain their feedback on the idea. Anthony Emmert mentioned that United and DBS&A team will be meeting with CDFW regarding mitigation concepts. Mr. Emmert suggested the GSA flesh out this concept as much as possible, and if the Board and CDFW are supportive of the concept, the GSA can than

> provide an outline of the concept to be included in the GSP. Director Meneghin requested an indication from the Board regarding her request to have a fund for GDEs. Director Meneghin asked Mr. Morgan if there seems to only be interest in the Cienega site, when there is also rising groundwater downstream near the Fillmore-Santa Paula basins boundary, around "Lost Creek." She added that if the GSA is planning to have monitoring wells to monitor groundwater levels in this area, it seems that the GSA should also have temperature loggers for the stream to monitor surface water temperatures.

> Vice Chair McFadden stated that he felt that an Arundo removal fund is beyond the scope of the GSA, and he would be cautious about diving into that. He also asked Mr. Morgan to show on the map previously displayed where the wells are located that California Department of Fish and Wildlife uses to supply water to the Fish Hatchery. Mr. Morgan pointed out four wells owned by CDFW. Vice Chair McFadden asked if those wells can be used for anything other than to supply water to the Fish Hatchery? Mr. Morgan stated he would talk to CDFW Hatchery Manager on how they use those wells, what pumping rates are, if they have extra capacity on those wells, and if the GSA might be able to put the wells to use in drought periods. He also stated that the GSA could potentially help them re-equip additional wells on their property, and if appropriate, pump water that can be available to the restoration area during drought periods.

Director Pace stated he is concerned when we say we are going to mitigate. He said the concept sounds good, but what all does that entail, and what is the time span for mitigation? He also questioned if the GSA would open itself to an unreasonable and significant impact to other stakeholders. He said he would like more information but does not feel the GSA will have that information when making that first decision, at least framework wise, and having order of magnitude of mitigation costs would be helpful.

Director Villasenor stated she agreed with Director Meneghin on the Arundo removal, but mentioned if the GSA is going to mitigate, it needs to have agreements with the other agencies that are also working on removing the Arundo, so to work together to run both the mitigation and the removal of arundo to give the native riparian species a better chance. She also mentioned that Director Pace brought up a good point on wanting to know the magnitude of the mitigation in order to determine its impact and whether it might be too much.

Director Kimball stated that he is aware that there are a significant number of stakeholders that have a great deal of commitment and passion for the goal of reestablishing steelhead in significant numbers, and said the GSA needs to be sensitive to that. At the same time the GSA has many stakeholders who live in the Fillmore and Piru basins and form a very significant agricultural industry that depends on this water, and those people are watching the GSA as well. He said that the GSA needs to be aware of its authorities and duties under SGMA, and that the GSA can fulfill those duties without overstepping its authority and responsibilities. He concluded by saying he would support the proposal from Mr. Morgan's draft chart.

Participant chat, "What alternative mitigation strategies were investigated or discussed." Mr. Tony Morgan stated they did look at what impact the groundwater pumping and reduced pumping has at the Fish Hatchery and Willard Road in the western Fillmore basin, and found groundwater pumping does have an impact, but also that drought has a much larger impact on the shallow aquifer water levels.

Participant chat, "Is it correct to conclude from the chart that the GSA would provide mitigation water for 21 consecutive years as shown in one part of the chart? It seems at some point during that period that pumping is no longer really a factor that needs to be addressed." Mr. Morgan agreed and said it will need to be wrestled with in the mitigation plan and the coordination with CDFW.

Participant chat, "If pumping doesn't impact the GDEs, then do we have to mitigate impacts of drought to the GDEs under SGMA, or is that impact more appropriately addressed under other projects outside of SGMA?" Mr. Morgan stated that basin pumping does affect the GDEs during a drought, but not just pumping affects those shallow aquifer water levels.

Chair Long asked Mr. E.J. Remson from The Nature Conservancy if there are already agencies funding removal of invasives from the Santa Clara River. Mr. Remson stated that it is a misnomer – currently there is no one out there with funds dedicated to removing invasives from the Santa Clara River. He stated he felt there should be some responsibility borne by the GSA, some sort of fund that can be tapped and maybe used as matching funds for some grant programs to make it easier to secure grants to do the restoration.

<u>Motion</u>

Motion to adopt the Minimum Thresholds and Measurable Objectives for surface water depletion and groundwater elevation, as proposed on the chart presented by Mr. Morgan, by Vice Chair McFadden; Second, Chair Long. Roll call vote: five ayes (Chair Long, Vice Chair McFadden, Kimball, Pace, Villaseñor); none opposed, one abstained (Meneghin). Motion carries 5/0/1.

Director Meneghin proposed a motion to include a minimum threshold of water temperature of 26 degrees Celsius and to include a monitoring plan for the presence or absence of steelhead, with the potential for supplemental water purchases as a mitigation plan. Motion did not receive a second, and therefore failed for lack of a second, per Legal Counsel.

Chair Long asked Legal Counsel about the funds mentioned by Mr. Matt Freeman regarding the invasive vegetation removal, and if it were something the Directors would want. Director Pace requested more information from legal, and to see what the dollar amount might be. Director Meneghin mentioned the GSA could have some orders of magnitude, as they have with the Cienega restoration. Chair Long said that the GSA needs to address this as a future agenda item.

Executive Director Emmert stated he and the consultant team will continue to meet with CDFW to explore and better define potential mitigation measures at the Cienega site and asked Chair Long if the Board would like him to meet with E.J. Remson and discuss the cost of invasive vegetation removal.

Chair Long asked Mr. Emmert to report on when a draft GSPs would be available. Mr. Emmert stated the current schedule is set for release of a public draft of the GSPs on July 29 for a 60-day comment period for the public, and the GSA also to plans for a public workshop in the middle of the comment period.

1. Call to Order – First Open Session 5:00 pm

Chair Long called the meeting to order at 5:00 pm.

1A. Pledge of Allegiance

Director Pace led participants in the Pledge of Allegiance.

1B. Directors Roll Call

Roll call: (Chair Long, Vice Chair McFadden, Kimball, Meneghin, Pace, Villaseñor); all Directors present.

1C. Public Comments

Chair Long asked if there were any public comments; none were offered.

1D. Approval of Agenda Motion

Motion to approve the agenda, Vice Chair McFadden; Second, Director Meneghin. Roll call vote: six ayes (Chair Long, Vice Chair McFadden, Kimball, Meneghin, Pace, Villaseñor); none opposed. Motion carries 6/0.

2. UPDATES

2A Director Announcements/Board Communications:

Oral Reports from the Board

Fillmore Pumpers Association Stakeholder Director Update

Director Kimball reported the Fillmore Basin Pumpers Association had their annual meeting for all the legal items for the Associations and also had the Fillmore Board of Directors meeting where they discussed progress being made on the GSP, received an update from Bryan Bondy and discussed the SMCs.

Piru Pumpers Association Stakeholder Director Update

Director Pace reported that the Piru Basin Pumpers Association was the same as that of the Fillmore Pumpers Association.

Environmental Stakeholder Director Update

Director Meneghin reported that the updated Bulletin 118 is out for circulation and the Friends of the Santa Clara River has been participating in the nongovernment organization collaborative, which has been providing comments to DWR regarding groundwater management.

City of Fillmore Member Director Update

Director Villasenor reported that the Fillmore City Council recently approved of \$1,000,000 for some long-needed infrastructure improvements, including some updates to water lines and sewer lines. She stated that the City of Fillmore is also researching potential American Rescue Plan Act funding for other City infrastructure improvements. For water, the Council did approve a new SCADA system, and Public Works Director David Smallwood provided her with an overview of the outdated system they have been using. She also mentioned Mr. Smallwood took her on a tour of the city of Fillmore and showed her how the water systems runs.

United Water Conservation District Member Director Update

Vice Chair McFadden stated he had nothing to report.

County of Ventura Member Director Update

Chair Long reported the Supervisors are going through the budget process and requested people join on Monday for the budget hearings, via the website. She also stated that the Supervisors are working to secure potential funding from the State budget that is experiencing a surplus for County water supply resilience projects.

2B Executive Director Update Information Item

Executive Director Anthony Emmert provide an update stating that he, Tony Morgan, Patrick O'Connell, and Dan Detmer had a very good meeting with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and other interested parties regarding potential drought mitigation measures. He stated that discussions centered on the state-owned properties surrounding the Fish Hatchery that are being earmarked for restoration projects, as discussed during the GSA's recent SMC discussions. He mentioned the primary objective for that meeting was to make sure the new monitoring well locations are being coordinated with the state agency landowners, and to float the idea of the GSA enhancing the existing Cienega project. He stated that the discussions were positive, and that there was agreement regarding the siting of the monitoring wells, and good discussion regarding the potential use of an existing well to provide additional water to an area of the restoration site during future droughts.

Mr. Emmert mentioned that DWR requested clarifications on grant invoice and progress report number eight; staff has provided clarifications and will resubmit. He mentioned he will be requesting a grant budget modification and a potential extension of the grant term with grant manager Eduardo Pech. He also mentioned that United staff is continuing progress on the Regional Groundwater Model documentation, with a target completion date of June 30. He stated that United expects to send the documentation package to the expert panel in the near future and hopes to receive a response from the panel by July 28. He also mentioned the monitoring wells project is in progress with CEQA documents filed, site procurement is in progress, and bids for drilling are pending. Another item mentioned was a contract amendment for DBS&A.

2C Legal Counsel Update Information Item

Legal Counsel Scott Nave stated that at the last meeting Chair Long requested that legal prepare a memo stating whether the GSA had authority under SGMA to fund the removal of non-native vegetation. Mr. Nave stated the conditions under which the GSA would have the authority for plant removal

and stated that a memo was sent to the Board. All Board members were in agreement for posting the memo to the GSA website.

2D GSP Consultant Update Information Item

Mr. Tony Morgan of DBS&A requested that all Board members provide him and Mrs. Lisa Ballin with a summary of any outreach and engagements that each Board member has had, any outside activities to be added to the list that is needed to complete the GSA. Mr. Morgan requested the list be sent by the first week of July. Mrs. Ballin explained the reason for the requested list and what information is requested. Mr. Morgan presented a slide showing the Tentative Schedule and a copy of the schedule that was sent to all Board members prior to the meeting, then he explained the schedule.

Chair Long asked if the notice of intent to adopt is set for July 30, and if that is going to work, as the Board meeting is set for July 15. Mr. Morgan said yes, that is fine. Chair Long also asked if the draft is being posted for public review, and if the GSA needs to set up a meeting for that. Mr. Morgan stated that the GSA can post it on the website and send out notification to all interested parties of the Draft GSP being available for review and public comment.

Director Meneghin asked if number 19 - projects, and management actions, are going to be discussed at the July Board meeting. Mr. Morgan said the only projects and management discussion the GSA will be having is the Board's election to do mitigation during drought periods and provide water to the Cienega project. Director Meneghin reiterated that she felt that the GSA Board needs to have a discussion regarding potential additional projects, including purchasing water, before the draft GSPs are published. Mr. Morgan stated the GSA could add it as a potential project, and it can be discussed once the draft goes out.

Director Kimball asked if one stakeholder meeting would be sufficient, just in case someone has a conflict and cannot attend, can they have an opportunity to attend a second one. 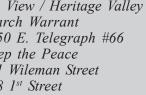

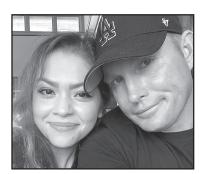

SUMMARY

The agreement between the Fillmore and Piru Basins Groundwater Sustainability Agency and the United Water Conservation District makes provision for periodic changes in labor rates and requires the District to provide the Agency with notice of those changes. The required notice to the Agency is provided via this report.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Board will receive and file the United Water Conservation District labor rates document for Fiscal Year 2021-2022.

BACKGROUND

The professional services agreement between the Fillmore and Piru Basins Groundwater Sustainability Agency (Agency) and the United Water Conservation District (District) for staff services, executed on April 19, 2018 and amended on August 23, 2018, makes provision for the District to periodically change the labor rates it charges to the Agency, and requires the District to provide the Agency with notification of such changes. With the adoption of its Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Budget on June 9, 2021, the District's overall hourly labor rates increased. Following adoption of its budget, the District provided the Agency. A copy of the District's Labor Rates Sheet for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 is attached to this report.

The anticipated labor rates were incorporated into the Agency's Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget, adopted by the Board of Directors during its June 17, 2021, regular meeting.

FISCAL IMPACT

There are sufficient funds included in the Agency's Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget to accommodate the labor rate change from the District, as the increased labor rates are already incorporated into the Agency's Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget.

SUMMARY:

The proposed Amendment No. 2 in the amount of \$278,996 to the Agreement with Daniel B. Stephens & Associates will cover out-of-scope stakeholder outreach and groundwater sustainability planning services for the analysis, preparation and stakeholder coordination associated with the recent development of the Agency's sustainable management criteria and the ongoing development of the Agency's groundwater sustainability plans.

RECCOMENDATION:

The Board will consider authorizing Amendment No. 2 to the Agreement with Daniel B. Stephens & Associates, Inc. for additional groundwater sustainability planning and stakeholder outreach services.

BACKGROUND

The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act requires groundwater sustainability agencies to work closely with local stakeholders to develop their groundwater sustainability plans. Over the past three years, the Fillmore and Piru Basins Groundwater Sustainability Agency (Agency) Board, staff and consultant team have invested significant time and effort into fulfilling this requirement. The level of effort has exceeded the initial scope of work for its groundwater sustainability planning consultant, Daniel B. Stephens and Associates (DBS&A). The primary work areas that have exceeded the initial contract budget include stakeholder outreach and the development of the Agency's sustainable management criteria that are the foundational elements of its groundwater sustainability plans.

Amendment Number 2 for \$278,996 has been prepared to cover the out-of-scope work that has been completed to date and to cover the anticipated cost of work to complete and submit the Agency's groundwater sustainability plans in January 2022. Primary out-of-scope stakeholder outreach work completed to date includes: 1) the development of a Guiding Principles document; 2) the development and implementation of a robust Stakeholder Communication and Engagement Plan; and 3) numerous unanticipated stakeholder workshops and special board meetings to review the technical memoranda, the modeling analyses, and to develop the sustainable management criteria. The primary out-of-scope groundwater sustainability planning work completed to date includes: 1) the extensive analysis done to support and develop the

sustainable management criteria; and 2) associated public meetings to discuss the different possible approaches. Recommended future scope not included in the original agreement includes: 1) the use of the California State University Sacramento through January 2022 to assist with stakeholder coordination at board meetings and upcoming workshop for public review of the draft groundwater sustainability plans, and to assist with the collation of and responses to reviewer comments on the draft documents; 2) Stillwater Sciences staff attendance at additional board meetings and workshops, as well as preparation of responses to comments on the public review draft plans, with a focus on the groundwater dependent ecosystems; and 3) additional DBS&A time to prepare the plans on an accelerated schedule.

Staff recommends the Agency consider approval of Amendment No. 2 in the amount of \$278,996. Previously, the Agency approved Amendment No. 1 in the amount of \$19,972 for assistance with developing specifications for the Agency's monitoring wells project. Approval of Amendment No. 2 would bring the total for the DBS&A Agreement to \$1,093,968.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Agency's Fiscal Year 2020-2021 and Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budgets include sufficient funds in the Professional Services-Groundwater Sustainability Planning Consultant line item to cover the \$278,996 cost of the proposed scope of work. Both the stakeholder outreach and groundwater sustainability planning activities are components of the Agency's groundwater sustainability planning grant with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR). Agency staff and DWR staff are currently working toward a grant budget amendment that would increase the line items for stakeholder outreach and groundwater sustainability planning and reduce the line item for the monitoring wells project. If successful, the amended grant could provide reimbursement for a portion of the Agency's additional expenditures included in the Amendment No. 2.

SECTION 3 - CONSIDERATION

Section 7 of the Original Agreement, "Compensation" is amended to reflect the following new total payment amount:

"Total payments shall not exceed \$ 1,093,968."

Daniel B. Stephens and Associates, Inc. (DBS&A) has prepared this Contract Amendment Request pursuant to our existing contract (Professional Services Agreement No. 2019-01-18-DBSA executed in January 2019) to assist the FPBGSA in the development of Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSPs) for each of the Fillmore and Piru groundwater basins.

1. Background

The DBS&A consultant team has been working closely with the FPBGSA staff, as well as the Board of Directors and stakeholders to establish a framework for guiding the groundwater basins into a sustainable condition. The process of developing the Sustainable Management Criteria (SMCs) that are foundational elements of the GSPs has required extensive interaction between the Directors, FPBGSA staff, stakeholders, and the DBS&A consultant team. The extent of this interaction was not envisioned when the original contract was developed. As a result, significant DBS&A team resources were utilized for this effort that were in excess of the estimated amounts for certain budgetary line items. This contract amendment is being requested to balance the excess resources used to date.

Secondarily, the DBS&A team has developed a cost-to-complete estimate for this project and has identified specific project elements that are recognized as being necessary for completion of the GSPs, but were unaccounted for in the original project budget. These project elements have been included in Amendment 2, also.

2.2 Out-of-Scope (OOS) Items

The OOS items fall primarily into a few categories:

• Stakeholder engagement efforts and early work on the Communication and Engagement Plan, as well as the Guiding Principles, took more effort than anticipated; and



 Additional engagement efforts associated with the supplemental Board meetings and workshops over the last several months.

During the last several months, the primary GSP activity (Task 8 in the budget) has been associated with the development of the Sustainable Management Criteria (SMCs) and the analyses associated with assessing the impacts of varying approaches to establishing the SMCs. The sum of Task 8 invoiced amounts is shown below. However, it is recognized that not all of the GSP activities in Task 8 were associated with SMCs, so the DBS&A labor total for Task 8 was discounted by 15% to arrive at an OOS value.

The stakeholder and engagement program (also called a Communication and Engagement Plan [CEP]) developed by FPBGSA for the development of the GSPs is robust and directly addresses the level of effort envisioned by California Dept of Water Resources (DWR). The process to develop the CEP included significant additional support from the DBS&A team as the process evolved from ad hoc committee discussions of Guiding Principles, to Board and stakeholder deliberations on the specifics of the CEP, and implementation of the CEP over the span of many Board meetings and workshops. This level of effort was not envisioned during budget development, and while necessary for the successful development and implementation of the CEP, resulted in additional OOS costs (see below).

2.3 Estimated Cost-to-Complete (CTC)

The DBS&A team has compiled an estimated CTC. The CTC includes estimates of DBS&A personnel labor costs, as well as costs expected for CSUS (Lisa Ballin) and SWS (Stillwater Sciences). The assumptions used to develop the CTC are shown below. Labor commitments to the project are reduced during the month of Aug and Sept 2021 while the public review drafts of the GSPs are being examined by the Board of Directors and interested stakeholders.

SUBJECT: Resolution 2021-05 Establishing Standardization of Management of Fillmore and Piru Basins

RECCOMENDATION:

The Board will consider adopting Resolution 2021-05 establishing standardized management of both the Fillmore and Piru basins.

BACKGROUND

The California Department of Water Resource, in its Bulletin 118, recognizes the Fillmore and Piru basins as sub-basins of the Santa Clara River Valley basin. The two basins are adjacent to one another and share hydrologic and hydrogeologic characteristics, share similar ecosystem characteristics, and contain many of the same sensitive species. The land use in both basins is similar, including irrigated agriculture, unirrigated rangeland, urban development, and undeveloped open spaces. Both the County of Ventura and the United Water Conservation District service areas overlie both basins. A significant number of groundwater users also operate in both basins. For these reasons, the Fillmore and Piru Basins Groundwater Sustainability Agency (Agency) was formed as one groundwater sustainability agency to manage both basins.

From its creation, the Agency has worked to comply with the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) in an efficient and pragmatic manner. Due to the many similarities between the basins, the Agency is working to develop SGMA-compliant groundwater sustainability plans for both basins that mirror each other, with a standardized set of sustainable management criteria that apply to both basins. The policies that the Agency has developed to date also apply to both basins. Maintaining consistency and standardization in its future plans, policies and programs will be important to the Agency carrying-out its SGMA responsibilities without becoming overly complicated or burdensome to the stakeholders. Adoption of Resolution 2021-05 will indicate the Agency Board of Directors' intent to continue forward with management of the two basins in a standardized manner.
